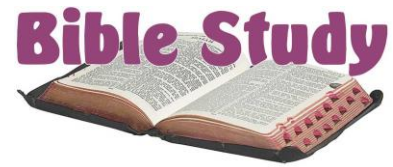

PASTORAL VISITS

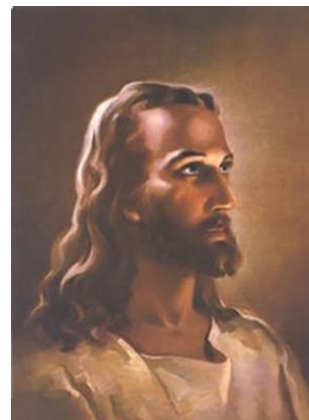

Everyone has noticed the sanctuary painting that's been going on. It's just about finished. The next phase will be the floor. They're looking at 'runners' in the aisles and wood laminate under the pews. Lucy Kendall welcomes your thoughts. They will also be assembling a metal ramp outside Pastor's office in the back of the building to replace the wooden ramp which has steadily deteriorated. It has been donated and Charlie Bojus will be directing the assembly.

Many have noticed the picture on the wall as you leave the church. It is a copy of a painting by Warner Sallman from 1940. It was a popular

depiction during the war and was said to have been reproduced over 500 million times, according to publishers (Kriebel & Bates). Since no one knows what Jesus looked like, and the Scriptures don't describe Jesus physically, this is simply a visual depiction from the artists mind. It was donated to the church at some point, and was over the altar for a number of years. As I understand it, the leaders of the church decided to remove it years ago, and replaced it with the cross. It was relegated to the back corner of the sanctuary, and evidently it upset some people to the point of leaving. In any case, someone thought it might be placed over the doors leading out of church. It seems like a good place as a final reminder of our Lord's sacrifice for us. Feel free to comment pro or con to the Pastor if you have thoughts.

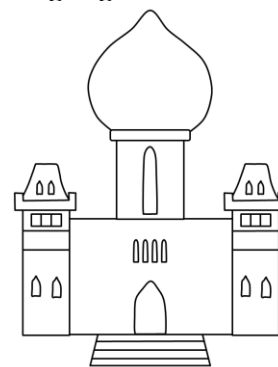

The flowers are blooming and the birds are singing!!!

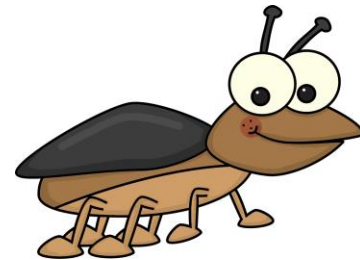
