Pastor's Corner

The last few weeks the lessons from Matthew have focused on the Great Commission and Jesus' instructions to his disciples as he sends them out on their first mission. It reminds us that we are a 'mission church' and each of us is meant to spread the 'good news of God's love in Jesus Christ.' What does it all mean?

You may have heard the story about the Sunday schooler who expressed her disappointment about the class. "The teacher kept telling us to go out into the world to make disciples of all nations, but all we did was sit there - for a whole hour." It's not uncommon to find a church crammed with faithfilled people neglecting to share their faith - a kind of contradiction in terms. We Christians struggle with how to express our faith in meaningful ways, realizing that Christianity will not spread unless we do it. Yet we also question some of the aggressive and heavy-handed ways other groups do it. It seems that Jesus was less intrusive and more invitational - he blessed them, he loved them, he came to their aid and taught them, and they followed. We may wonder how we can possibly convey the message of God's love without coming on too strong or appearing self-righteous.

So, how do we testify to the benefits of the Christian life? Can we truly be a Christian without witnessing to others? Isn't it enough that I'm a 'good person' and try not to hurt anyone?

If Christianity was about my personal faith, it would be acceptable to remain silent. There are religions that focus on the individual and they emphasize being a better person, trying to gain individual salvation by gaining God's favor. But Christianity is a communal religion. We have been chosen by God to be a people who love God and each other. We seek to be self-less, regarding others as fellow creatures of a loving God. God wants us all to be part of God's Kingdom. And so we reach out.

Like many other things, witnessing our faith often happens in the course of daily events. God presents 'openings' to share what we believe. One way is by modeling Christian behavior, acting in a Christ-like way. People around you may well ask or pick up on the fact that you act in love or with compassion. The 4th Century teacher – John Chrysostom – was quick to say, "Let us astound them before all words, by our way of life." A second way is by practicing the disciplines of faith – worship, study, prayer, service, and meditation. If people see how important your faith is to you, they may desire the same for themselves. A final way is to 'be prepared' when people seek your counsel. Are you able to cite examples of holy living, Biblical characters who have experienced frustrations, depression, challenges, or other issues that others might identify with? We must always be careful not to put another down for their lack of faith or loose living, but sensitively seek to give sincere advice.

God suggests that we needn't worry about what to say or do in a given situation, but the Holy Spirit will supply for the need. If we practice our faith, we'll never be found 'wanting'. God bless you!

It's interesting to note that since last year, our contributions have shifted slightly from loose plate to pledge. This is a result of moving a few individuals into the "pledge" classification because they have become regular contributors. So loose plate collections are down somewhat and pledge (and regular attendee) collections are up by a comparable amount. Overall year-to-date collections total \$31,323, which is consistent with past experience for this time period.

In addition, we will engage Andrea Libby of Libby Computers to assist in the installation and initial training to familiarize Pat and others with the new operating system. If you have any news you would like to share, please submit it to the church office by the 20th of the month. We would love to hear about your travels and adventures.



ARE YOU INTERESTED IN BECOMING A CHURCH MEMBER?

When you're a member of a church, it means you've made a commitment to your faith. You have said "I'm a follower of Jesus Christ and a member of a Christian community." It also helps from the church's point of view to know who can be counted on to continue the church.

First Christian Church has 2 categories of members. One is as a full member – those who consider First Christian Church of Freedom their primary church. We also have a second category of people who may belong to another congregation. It's called 'associate membership'. It may be that a person is a lifetime member of a church in another state, and really wants to retain their membership there. Or, it may be, as is the case with me and many others, that for other benefits one wants to maintain

membership in a church of a particular denomination, or where one's family has always been a member, and it is necessary or desirable that one retain membership in a denominational church. In this case, one can become an associate member here and have all the privileges of a full member — vote, pastoral care, involvement in various ministries, serving in leadership, etc.

We want to invite those who are not, to become full or associate members. Being on this 'list' does not make anyone better or more Christian than anyone else, but it does help us get 'a handle' on 'who we are' as a congregation, and maybe how we need to shape our mission and ministries.

Freedom Food Pantry

The Quality of Life Award is given annually to someone who has gone over and above in their volunteer efforts to help people in Carroll County – making sure that people receive needed services, helping to organize and facilitate getting these services to the people that need them, and promoting the Mount Washington Valley as a wonderful place to visit and to live. Doris Sirois of Freedom is a long-time volunteer who certainly meets the standards of this award. Doris has been an RSVP volunteer since January of 2009 and has contributed much to the health and well-being of many people in Carroll County.

Doris comes from a management background and has used those experiences to help better organize the Freedom Food Pantry, and most especially to work to get a continuing source of funding for the Pantry. She was instrumental in getting the budget committees to put funding articles on the town warrants in Freedom, Effingham, and Ossipee. As a result of her efforts, and a good PR push by Doris and friends, the Pantry received not the \$5000 they hoped for, but actually \$8000!! Doris is very persistent when it comes to causes that help those in need in her community.

Doris and her husband Paul work very hard for the Freedom Food Pantry. She has been known to spend hours doing food shopping in Manchester for the pantry, picking up donations from the USDA or arranging for their pickup, and then coming back and helping to get it all organized and arranged for distribution to the folks who really need it.

Doris also finds time to serve as the Assistant Treasurer of the Community Club in Freedom, and meets with the Ladies' Guild at the Freedom Church each week to help make their lovely quilts and lap robes, many of which they donate to RSVP for distribution to nursing homes, day care centers and the Birthing Center at Memorial Hospital.

Between the work at the Food Pantry and the Quilt-making at the Ladies' Guild, Doris has given over 2,600 hours of volunteer time to RSVP in the past five years.

So — all in all, it is safe to say that Doris Sirois certainly deserves the 2014 Quality of Life Award and all of us at First Christian Church in Freedom are very proud and pleased that Doris has received this well-deserved award.
