"FURY, FEAR, AND FAITH" based on Mark 4:35-41, and Job 38:1-11

Intro: H.G. Wells' quote: "Dignified peace is just a hopeless dream." -is peace the longing of every heart? Being completely satisfied with no enemies or burdens.

- stranger to most people today, stress and anxiety more likely. What if downsized, ill for long period, financially unstable. Disciples not the only ones longing for peace in raging storm.
- story well known. Jesus crossing Sea of Galilee, storm, panic, Jesus sleeping, woken up, wind and sea rebuked. Have you still no faith? Disciples filled with awe.

I. Fury of the Storm

- storms are a part of life. Can be weather induced, health related, terror in Charleston, etc.
- Mary Ellen Clark, premier diver, found to have vertigo, still won bronze medal in Olympics twice. Found passage in Philippians 4:12-13 to be inspiring: "...content in everything through Him who gives me strength ..."
- May be different: failed marriage, health, concern over child or adult child, loss of loved one, but sooner or later we'll be confronted with the fury of a storm.

II. Fear of the Disciples

- not unfamiliar with danger, were fishermen, but here they feared for their lives.
- Rembrandt's painting "Storm on the Sea of Galilee". He's the extra figure. Identified with disciples.
- Job in other Scripture. Faithful, successful, but lost everything in contest between God & Satan. Challenged God, but God tells Job not to question. Reminds us that we each face storms, often without explanation.

III. Faith of Jesus

- Jesus responded: rebuked wind and calmed waves.
- quoted from unknown poet: 'Doubt sees obstacles, faith sees way. Doubt sees darkest nights, faith sees day. Doubt dreads to take a step, faith soars on high. Doubt questions, who believes, faith answers, "I".

Conclusion: 3 pieces of real life, Christian is challenged to have faith to overcome the fury and fear! Families of victims in Charleston seem to be doing just that.
