

ARE YOU INTERESTED IN JOINING OUR FAMILY AND BECOMING A CHURCH MEMBER?

When you're a member of a church, it means you've made a commitment to your faith. You have said "I'm a follower of Jesus Christ and a member of a Christian community." It also helps from the church's point of view to know who can be counted on to continue the church.

First Christian Church has 2 categories of members. One is as a full member - those who consider First Christian Church of Freedom their primary church. We also have a second category of people who may belong to another congregation. called 'associate It's membership'. It may be that a person is a lifetime member of a church in another state, and really wants to retain their membership there. Or, it may be, as is the case with me and many others, that for other benefits, one wants to maintain membership in a church of a particular denomination, or where one's family has always been a member, and it is necessary or desirable that one retain membership in a denominational church. In this case, one can become an associate member here and have all the privileges of a full member - vote, pastoral care, involvement in various ministries, serving in leadership, etc.

We want to invite those who are not, to become full or associate members. Being on this 'list' does not make anyone better or more Christian than anyone else, but it does help us get 'a handle' on who we are as a congregation, and maybe how we need to shape our mission and ministries.

TREASURER'S REPORT

Church expenses are \$7,400 higher than income through October 23, 2017. While we remain hopeful year-end giving will close the gap completely there may be a small \$2,000 deficit for 2017. We continue to work on the 2018 budget. We have identified various ways to raise revenue to close the initial \$8,000 deficit and will discuss them at the November 2017 council meeting. The final 2018 budget recommendation is presented to congregation at the December 2017 annual meeting. I'd like to welcome Don Harris to the church Finance Committee. We look forward to working with him. The Finance Committee is looking for one additional member that can attend their quarterly meetings. Finance uses email as a way to communicate outside of the quarterly meetings. Please let Ellie Bossdorf, chair of the Finance Committee, or myself know if you would be interested to lend us a hand, even if it is only for periodic special project work. Church investments continue to do well and are secure at the custodians. 
REPORT OF THE FINANCIAL SECRETARY

As of October 15, 2017, we have collected \$50,434 in pledge and regular contributions. This is about \$1600 less than the same time period last year. However, loose plate offerings are up from last year for the same time period. We have collected \$5380, whereas we only had \$4348 last year during the same time period. The capital fund is doing well due to the function held in August this summer. We have collected \$29,385. It represents all donations made in memory of loved ones, as well as direct donation to the capital fund, and the money collected for the Modernistics concert. Overall revenues this year are approximately \$27,683 higher than the same time period last year. Carol Porter


MEDICAL EQUIPMENT AVAILABILITY

Every few months a group of Guild Members goes to Mardens to purchase fabric. Each person selects 3 different coordinating, one yard pieces and the flannel for backing. These 3 one yard pieces will make 3 different quilts because of the method in which they are cut and assembled. Then the process begins after the pattern is cut, sewing, tying and finally, sewing on a label. After Mardens, we have lunch together.

The guild voted to give \$1500 to the General Fund and \$500 to the Pastor's Discretionary Fund.
