UNWRAPPING THE GIFT, OR EPIPHANY

The season of Epiphany begins on the twelfth day of Christmas (Jan. 6), and continues until Ash Wednesday (Feb. 14), the beginning of Lent. During these weeks we are gradually exposed to the ministry of Jesus.

The first Sunday focuses on the Baptism of Jesus, then the calling of the disciples, his healings and preaching, and concluding with the Transfiguration. The word 'Epiphany' means "a sudden realization of the nature or meaning of something." In the case of the Christian, it is meant as an understanding or consciousness of who Jesus is. The Bible readings give an interpretation of Jesus as the Son of God who has come to reveal God's will It establishes his authority and his methods. We hear of Jesus being baptized, gathering followers, and reaching out with acts of mercy. As we get into the next season of Lent, we become aware of the unrest and controversy this created, but for the present we are enlightened as to his identity and power.

This is a wonderful opportunity to appreciate the depth and wideness of God' love. It reaches deep within our soul, and reaches to all the world. We are called to be disciples and followers of God's Word (the Word that became flesh and dwelt among us, full of grace and truth). We are also called to share this same Word with all the world (as Jesus went out throughout Galilee proclaiming the message).

So, are we doing it, are we unwrapping and sharing 'the gift'? Our little church provides a guide and source of inspiration for just that purpose. The Bible readings, the prayers, the music, the fellowship, are all based on the

message. I think we sometimes don't appreciate the function of the church, or we get caught up in the personalities, or we get overwhelmed by our own problems. If we can only concentrate on God, Jesus, and the work of the Holy Spirit – maybe, just maybe, we'll get beyond ourselves and see God's greater purpose for us. Jesus did this, and shows us the way. God's blessings as we again celebrate the season of Epiphany! See you in church. Pastor Larry


Another important thing about time is that you cannot stop it. There is no way to slow it down, turn it off, or adjust it. Time marches on.



ARE YOU INTERESTED IN JOINING OUR FAMILY AND BECOMING A CHURCH MEMBER?

When you're a member of a church, it means you've made a commitment to your faith. You have said "I'm a follower of Jesus Christ and a member of a Christian community." It also helps from the church's point of view to know who can be counted on to continue the church.

First Christian Church has 2 categories of members. One is as a full member - those who consider First Christian Church of Freedom their primary church. We also have a second category of people who may belong to another 'associate congregation. called It's membership'. It may be that a person is a lifetime member of a church in another state, and really wants to retain their membership there. Or, it may be, as is the case with me and many others, that for other benefits, one wants to maintain membership in a church of a particular denomination, or where one's family has always been a member, and it is necessary or desirable that one retain membership in a denominational church. In this case, one can become an associate member here and have all the privileges of a full member - vote, pastoral care, involvement in various ministries, serving in leadership, etc.

We want to invite those who are not, to become full or associate members. Being on this 'list' does not make anyone better or more Christian than anyone else, but it does help us get 'a handle' on who we are as a congregation,

and maybe how we need to shape our mission and ministries.

After the Sunday Service on December 10th, with the village looking appropriately seasonal from snowfall, Velma Hormell spoke about the history of our Christmas Eve Service. 1966 was the first year for this special celebration of the Nativity. Members of the church worked together then and over ensuing years to create the traditions we cherish to this day, over half a century later.

We heard about The Freedom Prayer written by a member of the congregation that we say in unison each December 24th. For many years the Vietnam War was a heavy presence in the lives of the congregation. The Roll of Honor was then and is now read to keep in hearts and minds dedicated, brave men and women from our families who were/are serving in the military at home and abroad. The Peace Candles, the Scripture of Jesus' Nativity, the children's pageants, the carols sung, and the closing of the Service with candles held in the darkened church as all sing "Silent Night" have been highlights of Christmas Eve. Some years there were many children participating, and other times adults assumed different roles in the Service. Numbers may vary but the Holy Spirit stays strong. The church has been blessed by those who have led us in Christmas worship through the Word and sacred music. The decorations of greens, the tree, wreaths, and flowers, candles in the windows, the wonderful stable scene on the front lawn are all important parts of our Christmas celebration that have evolved over the years.

We were pleased to hear the history from Velma. We were glad to listen to her wise observation that the time and talents of all our members through the decades were/are necessary to keep our church vital. The efforts of so many have brought us to yet another Christmas Eve and another new year in the life of this Body of Christ. Thanks be to God!

FOOD PANTRY






