

TREASURER'S REPORT

Church expenses are \$7,600 higher than income through April 11, 2018. This is about \$700 worse than last month. Pledge giving continues to be the reason for the shortfall continuing a pattern that began last year. Council continues to consider ways to address the issue.

The investment portfolio continues to experience volatility in 2018. A good January was followed by a correction in February with March showing a smaller retrenchment than February. The first few weeks of April have continued the volatility with large losses early followed by gains in the last week resulting in a slight gain for April, thus far. The Church recognizes the nature of the capital markets and invests accordingly. The Church has adequate liquidity to meet its obligations and short term requirements.

Investments are held at discount brokerage custodians Vanguard and TD Ameritrade. If you have any questions about any financial matters of the Church, please do not hesitate to speak with me, any Church officer or member of the Finance Committee.

Decorations and food will be funded by Thrivent Financial. All money raised that day will go to the music camp expenses.

A Glimpse of the Past





A rare early photo of the back of the church shows a small barn which was used to tie up the horses of the congregants during worship. If you're curious to know if there were facilities in the church, be assured that there was a privy at the rear of the Town Hall next door which could be used if necessary. Dates of this picture are uncertain, but we know the little barn was torn down by 1930.

The photo of the two buildings from the front was taken around 1907. The horse barn is visible between the two buildings if you look carefully. The Merrow house to the north was torn down in the 1950s, but the barn remains and is now an art gallery.

These pictures will be included in the Heritage Commission application to list the First Christian Church on the State of N.H. Register of Historic Places. An inventory done in 1989 is being rewritten as it must be updated every 10 years.

FOOD PANTRY

We continue to be active in serving the needs of the three surrounding communities. Doris has procured assistance from each of the towns served and the need certainly continues. We will be having our annual meeting of the food pantry board after food pantry (about 12) on May 12. We are also beginning to develop a procedure manual for those who will follow us. Come volunteer. We also got a very nice financial gift from the Masonic Lodge. And thanks to all for your support.

God has called us to be good stewards of the gifts He has given us. These gifts include our talents, time and monetary gifts. The congregation has been very generous in giving these gifts.

When the budget was set for 2018 we assumed that our pledged gifts and loose offering would meet our operating fund needs for the year. We rely on 90% of our income to come in through these two items. This has not happened. The trend over the past few months has put us in a deficit position. If this continues, we are looking at a possible deficit between \$5000-\$6000. What can we do about this as a congregation? The finance team is open to any suggestions. One thing we can do is pray about it because we know "the Lord does provide".


Another suggestion is that if 50 people could give an extra \$100 over the next 40 weeks we would be close to reaching our goal. Also, you might consider looking at your pledge for the year and decide if you can afford to increase that amount for the remainder of the year. If so let us know. We all depend on keeping the operating fund income in a positive position.

One other note, is that if you give a gift to the Capital Fund it does not affect the operating Fund. The operating fund is the focus of the day to day expenses of the church.

If you decide to give a gift please label it "Spring Appeal" so we can keep track of it.

David Mallett is an American folk singer songwriter hailing from Maine. In a career spanning four decades, he has recorded 14 albums, had several hundred covers of his songs, including the American folk classic Garden Song [Inch by Inch, Row by Row] and performed in clubs, concert halls and festivals across the US, Canada and Europe. He has appeared on numerous broadcasts, including National Public Radio's A Prairie Home Companion. Known for his carefully written, poetic offerings, his body of work has provided material for an eclectic list of artists that includes Alison Krauss, Pete Seeger, Hal Ketchum, Emmylou Harris, John Denver and the Muppets.

Doors will open at 6pm and concert will start at 7pm. Following the concert there will be a reception in the church basement for folks to mingle, purchase David Mallett's music, and learn about GMCG.
