TREASURER'S REPORT

Church expenses are \$2,500 higher than income through August 28, 2018. Pledge income continues to be weak although a large special donation and Spring Appeal donations have driven down the shortfall dramatically. Thanks to all! We have raised \$1,000 of our \$5,000 goal for the Spring Appeal. If we are able to meet the remaining \$4,000 the Church will be in fine shape for 2018. Parsonage expenses were up in August for one-time expenses but the Parsonage Fund is expected to finish the year in fine shape.

Investment portfolio returns continue to be volatile in 2018 but are doing well. Returns through May 2018 were 1.2% and have not moved significantly since. With four months left in the year, investments will see volatility due to uncertainty from mid-term elections, trade discussions and increasing interest rates. The Church maintains adequate liquidity to meet its obligations and short term cash requirements. Investments are held at discount brokerage custodians Vanguard and TD Ameritrade.




