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## Pastor's Pondering

Unless you love lots and lots of snow, and freezing, cold temperatures, along with windy days and icy walks and driveways, you are looking forward to an early Spring, or, at least, some warmer weather. The 'bad news' is that the forecasts don't look encouraging. The 'good news' is that Lent is here (depending on when you read this). And if Lent is here, can Easter be far behind? You all remember the formula - Easter is the first Sunday after the first full moon after the Spring equinox. Well, the Spring equinox is about March 21<sup>st</sup> (when day and

night are of equal length), and the next full moon is April 19<sup>th</sup>, so that makes Easter on April 21, the latest it can possibly be. So, hopefully, we'll have warm weather and maybe even some early flowers for our celebration.

Lent was named for the 'lengthening of days', and we'll really notice that on March 10<sup>th</sup> when daylight savings time begins. Actually, the days have been lengthening since December 21<sup>st</sup>, but the one or two minutes per day make it imperceptible. Lent has little to do with the weather, however. It is a period of the church year when we remember what God has done for us in Jesus Christ. Beginning with Ash Wednesday (March 6<sup>th</sup>), we mark a period of 40 days (not counting Sundays since they are always celebration days of worship), and we use that time to meditate on the sacrifice of Jesus on our behalf. Jesus intentionally went "to the cross" for us. He died that we might live, he became the perfect offering for our sin that we might be saved to eternal life. For carrying out that mission, for suffering and dying on our behalf, God raised him up as a first-fruits of God's promise of salvation to all who believe. That in brief is the crux of our faith, maybe better put in John 3:16.

So, in the next several weeks, as the light of our days increase, we are encouraged to deepen our spiritual lives. We certainly encourage regular worship. Daily devotions and prayer are worthy enterprises. If you don't attend our Bible study on Tuesdays or the Book study on

Thursdays, those would be excellent pursuits. There are certainly programs on TV or online that would lead in good directions. How about reading a good Biblical novel that would widen your horizons, or study a religious concept that has always intrigued you. Lent is a wonderful period to seek answers to our deepest questions about life and faith, and as we observe Holy Week and Easter, we are rewarded with the answer that God reveals – a burst of energy that empowers us to live triumphantly and boldly in the days ahead.

May God bless you and keep you as we experience the next few weeks!

## Lent Begins Ash Wednesday

**ASH WEDNESDAY - MARCH 6<sup>TH</sup> AT 4:30  
PM**

The beginning of Lent begins with a service with the imposition of ashes. As in the past, we have had a conflict with the 'community club' in terms of timing. Because of town elections, they have held a 'candidate night' on the Wednesday before voting. This causes a problem with parking if we were to have our service at the traditional time of 7 p.m. So, we are moving our service up to 4:30 pm. This will enable people to go to both, and not have to make 2 trips. The added advantage will be daylight, at least in coming to the service.

The season of Lent developed gradually in the church. From what historians can tell, one of the earliest pre-Easter traditions was fasting for the 40 hours between Good Friday and Easter morning. Folks understood that Christ was in the tomb for 40 hours, so a period of fasting and remembering the sacrifice of Christ became part of the observance. Over time, the

fasting was extended to all of Holy Week. By the year 400, the Church decided on a season of Lent lasting 40 days, not counting Sundays which were considered mini- Easters. Why the ashes? This is an ancient custom signifying grief and mourning. In the early Church, Christians who had committed grave faults were obliged to do public penance. On Ash Wednesday the Bishop blessed the uncomfortable hairshirts which they were to wear during the 40 days, and sprinkled them with ashes. Then, while the faithful recited psalms, the penitents were turned out of the holy place because of their sins, just as Adam and Eve had been turned out of the Garden because of their disobedience. They could not enter the church again until Maundy Thursday after performing some act of penance and receiving absolution. As years went by, and as the truth of the Scripture sank in about 'all having sinned and falling short of the glory of God', all began to come to receive ashes.

So on Ash Wednesday, we offer the imposition of ashes to those who come forward, recognizing that we are sinners and in need of God's forgiveness.



## A MESSAGE FROM THE VICE PRESIDENT

They will be consulting the congregation, Pastor Larry, and the Council at various times as they move studiously through this important process. We won't let go of the Wogmans easily, but all of us understand the need to live closer to family and to enjoy a well-deserved retirement!

Ash Wednesday is March 6, which means Easter this year is very late in April. After this challenging Winter, that may be a blessing. Snow may melt at last; the crocuses and daffodils will have a better chance to burst through greening grasses; and our congregation can breathe welcome fresh air as we move towards Holy Week and the joys of Easter Sunday. Let us remember that we are meant to live in unity within this Body of Christ, with each of us using our gifts and graces to help fulfill the purposes for which we have been called, "...making every effort to maintain the unity of the Spirit in the bond of peace. There is one body and one Spirit, one faith, one baptism,

one God and Father of all, who is above all and through all and in all." (From Ephesians 4: 1-6 and 4:15-16 NRSV).

Thank you to every volunteer who steps forward to help maintain all the varied aspects of the life we share at FCCOF. Let us work and worship together in Love; let us care for both the physical structure and the spiritual life that is our church. And may we pray for the safe return to Freedom of all who have been away for the Winter, but who travel home to be here with us in the Spring!

## Treasurer Report

The Church financial situation is stable with no red flags to report. As of February 19, 2019. Church income exceeds expenses by \$2,000. Payroll coming in the next two weeks will eliminate the excess income. It is still very early in the year to make any observations as to how the year will turn out.

2018 W-2's were provided to all employees timely with all payroll taxes paid. The Church Directors' and Officers' insurance policy is about to renew and will be paid timely. Food Pantry account balances continue to increase. The parsonage lease is being renewed for another year.

While 2018 saw the Church's diversified portfolio fall 3.2% for the full year, 2019 has enjoyed a significant recovery. The church maintains adequate liquidity to meet its obligations and short term cash requirements. Investments are held at discount brokerage custodians, Vanguard and TD Ameritrade.
