This past year the congregation has worked to insure that our historic building, in the heart of Freedom Village, is being well-maintained. Our Trustees prioritized immediate, ongoing and future needs to keep our structure and grounds strong, durable, accessible, safe and attractive as we move toward 2020 and beyond. Council has made decisions on each annual budget to maintain excellent personnel and programs to see to the well-being of the spiritual lives we share within this physical building.

When we consider that we are a small, nondenominational congregation that must finance our own needs, the length of our history since 1867, when the church itself was built, is remarkable. Our journeys of faith and fellowship intertwine and enrich the community of members as well as friends and visitors who pass through our doors for Sunday and holiday worship; for rites of baptism, marriage, death; for involvement in ministries and outreach that are at the center of our Christian existence. We have been dedicated to upholding our relationships with God and with one another as sojourners and stewards in Creation.

To this purpose of keeping FCCOF vital, we have an annual time for financial pledging. Pledges, whatever the amounts, allow our finance officers and committees to plan a yearly budget. The information from pledge amounts is important to the shaping of what we can do each year – and we are mindful that situations change – pledges may need to be decreased, or increases may be possible, during the year. Life brings surprises to us all! But having a basic financial picture for budget planning is so very helpful.

Whatever your ability this year, please consider making a pledge to our shared "treasury" of faith and works. We remember our gratitude to God for our blessings and we recall the teaching of Scripture that where our treasure is there also is our heart. We will reflect sincerely on our own commitments to stewardship in pledging this November. We hope you will as well. Let us pray in thanks for all we share in this church in time, treasure and talent in the presence of the Father, the Son and the Holy Spirit. Amen. And Happy Thanksgiving to all.
