TREASURER'S REPORT



Church Financial Activity

Church expenses exceeded income through April 20, 2020 by \$5,400. The loss is a little higher than usual at this time of year due to suspension of Sunday services and all the family disruptions arising from Covid-19. Giving is \$3,000 lower this year than last year.

The church was approved for a \$13,100 SBA PPP loan to help during this crisis. The portion of the loan that is used for payroll and utilities is <u>not</u> required to be paid back. The program covers the 8 week period following closing on the loan which has not yet been scheduled. I expect the closing in the next week or two which would cover us until the end of June. We all expect things to be better by then and hope Sunday services, church office hours and regular church meetings to resume.

The Anderson rainy day fund paid out \$3,630 this year to cover the remaining balance of church pew cushions and a new central vacuum system for the church.

Five 2019-2020 George Davidson Scholarship recipients received their awards this year totaling \$5,500.

Investments

As all of you know, the stock market was hit hard in March as uncertainty surrounding the Covid-19 pandemic resulted in a 35% drop in the stock market from their February highs. The corona virus caused our governmental leaders to close down non-essential services making the medical crisis a financial crisis.

First quarter 2020 losses for the church portfolio amounted to 10.8% pretty much giving back all of 2019's gains. Since March 31st, the portfolio has recovered 3.8%, although many believe it will take years to fully recover. The portfolio is diversified with a very strong cash position able to weather this financial storm. Church investments are held at discount brokerage custodians, Vangard and TD Ameritrade.
