On site, Patty and I hold down the fort on Mondays and Wednesdays, and I occasionally come in on Thursdays (briefly), as well. Remember, I am always available by appointment if anyone needs a visit during other times.

Finally, as we enter our second year together, I want you to know that I am still feeling very blessed to be here with and among you. Over the past twelve months, we have slowly come to know each other a little bit. It is a more gradual process than we might have experienced or preferred pre-pandemic. No coffee hours or church suppers, those cherished times when we gather and linger and chat about our families and life events. Never the less, we have found ways to reach out to one another, to stay in touch and to hold each other in prayer.

I find comfort in these words from Zephaniah 3:17 and I share them with you here, that you

may be comforted and encouraged as well (I especially like the idea of God's loud singing!).

Treasurer Report

Church Financial Activity

All Church expenses received are paid. As of September 28, 2021, Church expenses exceed income by \$24,100 which is \$11,600 worse than 2 months ago. Annual insurance payments accounted for almost half of the spending. Giving is weak and is actually less than 2020 levels when the church was closed due to Covid-19. assistance Financial from Parsonage Fund, the Perpetual Fund and

Round 2 of the SBA Payroll Protection Plan (PPP) will cover the majority of the \$24,000 but will likely be a deficit year without a pick-up in giving between now and the end of the year.

Investments

The Church pooled investment portfolio continues to perform well in 2021. The Church investment portfolio is diversified with a strong cash position. The Church pooled investment account is held by discount brokerage custodians Vanguard and TD Ameritrade. The Food Pantry investment account is held by Fidelity with Thrivent as their investment advisor.

The number of people served by our food pantry continues to rise. In August we served 36 families (a total of 98 people) with food for 2058 meals.


September figures have not been totaled yet.
