Our time on the island has special meaning for us, not only because we have a chance to reconnect with friends, stretching back twenty years, but also because we were married there during evening chapel in 2004. It's a 'busman's holiday' for me, but it is never the less restorative to be there on the rocks by the ocean and among so many people we love.



It's been a full summer at the church. Sunday mornings are returning to something like 'normal' as more of us are feeling comfortable gathering in person. We participated in Freedom Old Home Week again this year (a first for me) with a Blessing of the Animals, the Guild quilt and bake sale, a Sock Hop and probably more that I am forgetting. There was a time some twenty-plus years ago when I began the daily practice of greeting each morning with one of two lines, either Psalm 118:24, most commonly heard as, "This is the day the Lord has made; let us rejoice and be glad in it...", or the first line from E.E. Cummings, 'i thank You God for most this amazing day..."

Rain or shine, full day (usually) or empty calendar (seldom), foul mood or bounding out of bed with a glad heart (a toss-up), I reminded myself to stop and give thanks for This. One. More. Day. Whatever it presented and like it or not, "This is the day YHWH has made..." none other guaranteed.

In those days, my life was in turmoil. I was recently divorced, raising two teen-aged daughters, commuting six hundred miles a week up to central Maine and back, to be

with my aging parents in Dexter and attending seminary in Bangor. My mother was living with Alzheimer's, and her care fell to my father and brother, so I tried to be with them as often as I could.

All this to say, life was complicated. But isn't it? Isn't it always so? Not only the day to dayness of it all: what needs to be done to keep the household in tact, the kiddos fed, the dog walked, the bills paid or the workplace running, but also the world events over which we feel or fear we have absolutely no control.

It was a time when I had to learn how to let go of those things that actually were beyond my control and to absolutely do the things that had to be done, while accepting that the result wouldn't always be shiny. More important - I had to learn that relationships come before work and that rest is essential. Sabbath exists for a reason. Needless to say, I'm still learning.

Today the whole world is in turmoil. Perhaps it has been so in every age, but just now the stakes seem higher. I needn't recite a litany of woes, for you understand as well as I the perils we face, as a nation, a planet, a species - one among many.

It is said that we should "Let go and let God..." and there is truth to the notion. It is wise to let some worries go, to realize, for instance, that the world will spin without our pushing it, the sun will rise and the seasons will change without our help.

So, yes, let go and let God, but in the letting go, let us remember to participate in the creative process of promoting the common


good wherever and however we can. There is work to be done if we are to flourish together as God intends - even as we accept that the ultimate outcome is not ours to control.

However you name the One who set the Cosmos in motion, YHWH, Creator, Father/ Mother, God in three Persons, or the Lord is One, Holy Mystery, Providence, or Love - give yourself over to that Presence, trusting that you are not alone. Your burdens will not magically disappear, but you may rest awhile in something like welcoming arms of compassion and peace.

Work and Rest. Both are necessary for physical, mental, spiritual health and wellbeing. Both are commanded by God.

So as the summer winds down and autumn is fast upon us, take time for Sabbath rest. Reconnect with friends and family you've not seen in some time - even a card or a call, just to say hello. Life is short and unpredictable and we are here for each other through it all. See you in church!

## **Treasurer's Report**

Happy Summer! I hope everyone is getting out and enjoying life in the lovely world the Lord has provided for us all. The Church is open and providing all the services as it was prior to the pandemic. Worship attendance is improving, thanks to Pastor Mary and Carolyn, but is still not at pre-pandemic levels. Ladies Guild, Food Pantry and Church Committees are low on personnel and would benefit from any time you may be able to offer. Financially, giving continues to be weak. Reserves are available to help in the short term but if the Church is to thrive over the long run, income needs to increase from Giving or other sources.

Inflation hits the Church as it does each of us and while savings interest rates may go up and social security rise from COLA adjustments, grocery bills and the cost of energy is much higher than the increases. The Church is here for you if you need help. Please reach out to Pastor Mary if you are feeling overwhelmed.

For me, the summer has been busy. I have been working on next year's budget trying to manage large increases in Church insurance and energy costs. Church staff salaries will be reviewed in light of increased living costs.

The Church building is in good repair but Council is addressing needed repairs at the Parsonage. There are financial reserves available for these capital improvements.

#### **Investments**

Church and Food Pantry investments have fallen in value this year as all investment portfolios have been hit by inflation concerns. Both the Church and the Food Pantry investment portfolios are diversified. The Church has a strong cash position and the Food Pantry continues to bring in much more contributions than are needed to run the Pantry. So both the Church and the Food Pantry can ride out this dip in the stock and bond markets. The Church pooled investment account is held by discount brokerage custodians Vanguard and TD Ameritrade. The Food Pantry investment account is held by Fidelity with Thrivent as their investment advisor.
